The Rt. Hon. Tessa Jowell Attends Dulwich Junior Rapidplay

The KJCA (Kent Junior Chess Association) held its annual Dulwich Junior Rapidplay at Dulwich College on Sunday 4 March. The tournament was organised by Anita Voropayev. We were fortunate that The Rt. Hon. Tessa Jowell, MP for Dulwich and West Norwood, Secretary of State for Culture, the Media and Sport and Minister for the Olympics was available to present the prizes at the end. These were not only prizes for success in the tournament but also awards for passing ECF Certificate of Excellence exams at our February sitting. She is pictured above with some of those who received prizes and awards, along with IM Bob Wade OBE, the KJCA's Chief Arbiter, and the undersigned in front of 'Shackleton's Boat'.

She was very well received by children and parents alike and made some very positive comments about chess to the assembled gathering and privately to a few of us afterwards. She feels that there is scope for a major chess event, if not at the Olympics themselves, then associated with them in their immediate aftermath.

Melville Rodrigues, who has played a leading role in the ECF's recent successful campaign at Westminster for chess clubs and associations to have equal access with other sports bodies to charitable status and the benefits therefrom, was present, as was Edward Ochagavia, who runs the nearby Carnegie Chess Club at Herne Hill but who also has first-hand knowledge of the state support available to chess in Russia and the former USSR. The three of us were able to discuss with her afterwards the potential for chess to be recognized as a sport. She indicated that in principle she would support initiatives reaching Westminster to this end. She feels that it would be realistic to consider that such recognition would take about 3 years to achieve provided chess bodies take positive steps towards this goal during this period. She advised us to initiate contacts with the Sports Schools Partnerships around the country, suggesting that this would be the best way to obtain Sport England's support for chess' case at Westminster.

The Sports Schools Partnerships receive funding both from Sport England and Tessa's Ministry. Following up the contacts she gave us afterwards, Melville and I found that there are many of these all over the country. For example, there are 13 in our home area of Kent and south-east London alone. Contacts are at an early stage but it seems that, for example, it may be feasible for County Junior Associations





to negotiate the provision of budgets to enable schools to finance the creation of new chess clubs by covering expenditure on equipment and coaching. This could lead to a substantial upsurge in participation at grass roots' level. This would permeate through to Sport England, providing the impetus for them to support chess' case at Westminster. The ECF will now be looking at how to progress this nationally.

Returning to the tournament, there was an excellent turnout of 141 children not only from the local longstanding Dulwich hotbed of Kent junior chess but also from around the rest of Kent and south-east London, from the neighbouring counties of Essex, London, Surrey and Sussex and from as far afield as Hampshire and Hertfordshire. The section winners were: Under 18: William Jones (Lewisham CC); Under 14: Eugene Daley (Dulwich) and Sheila Dines (Sanderstead); Under 11: Nicholas Clanchy (Balham) and Under 9: Alexei Davis (Mottingham). The School Prize was won by Dulwich College Prep School. 22 children received awards for passing ECF Certificate of Excellence exams (6 in the Bronze, 12 in the Silver, 3 in the Gold and 1 in the Platinum).

The Dulwich tournament is the 5th in this season's Kent Junior Grand Prix. The Grand Prix leaders after 5 rounds are: Under 18: Lyall Bayliss (Crowborough CC); Under 14: William Jones; Under 11: Jasdeep Gahir (Lewisham CC) and Under 9: Alexei Davis. The leaders in the School Grand Prix after 5 rounds are: Secondary: Beths Grammar School, Bexley and Primary: Dulwich College Prep School. The Grand Prix now moves on to Tunbridge Wells on Sunday 6 May for the 6th round out of 8.

Major new English Prize for the British Championships. The English Chess Federation is delighted to announce that a major new sponsor has been found for an English National Chess Championship.

An initial donation of £10,000 has now been paid to the federation and similar payments will be made in subsequent years. In accordance with the sponsor's wishes, £2,000 will be made available for English prizes within the British Championship (£1,500 for the leading English man, £500 for the leading English woman) with the surplus put into the Permanent Invested Fund. It is anticipated that the English prizes will increase each year, and the sum within the Permanent Invested Fund will also increase, until it is sufficient for the FCF to launch a sustainable stand-alone English Championship with a significant prize fund. The donor wishes to remain anonymous, but is new to chess sponsorship.

David Welch, Manager of Congress Chess, described the donation as "exceptionally generous". "This individual has committed major funds to a project which the ECF has long desired. It is fantastic news."

Chief Executive Martin Regan also welcomed the sponsorship : "Although the search for a sponsor for the British continues, it is very welcome news that such a major new sponsor has been found for a future English Championship. I know the person involved and their modesty is matched only by their generosity."

Grading News

Six-Monthly Grading List – A six-monthly rapidplay list was produced in January. This was a success in that more than 90% of events were received by the deadline. I didn't receive a single comment on the list, which I actually considered to be a sign of success. When things go wrong, my in-box fills up with email! On the basis of the success of the rapidplay list, the ECF Board determined that a proposal should be brought to Council to also produce six-monthly standard play lists. If adopted this would mean that Grades would be published in July and January.

More frequent grades are beneficial for juniors and perhaps congresses. They do however create issues for winter league, since a league may not wish to change grading lists in mid season. For this reason, Council may determine to continue with annual grading lists for standard play and six-monthly lists for rapidplay.

In bringing a proposal to Council, the ECF Board is conscious that six-monthly standard play grades can only work if they are supported by the leagues and in particular their graders. It would be necessary for graders to submit a batch of results at the mid-season point. This plainly has significant implications for the league and the graders in particular. A consultation exercise with the graders is underway. The results of this exercise will be reported to Council as part of the proposal. I would suggest that if you have views on this proposal you should contact your ECF delegate for your local league.

Grading Forum – An ECF Grading Forum will be appearing shortly. Watch out on the ECF website for an announcement.

The History of Chess in Hastings

Hastings is widely regarded as the home of chess in England and this was reflected by a fascinating lecture which took place at the University Centre Hastings on Monday 12 February.

The event was hosted by Gerry Walsh, President of the English Chess Federation, who gave an account of his personal experiences of attending the Hastings International Congress – a very important date in the chess calendar.

Gerry's accounts of his experiences showed great commitment to the tournament, that he had been attending for an amazing 40 years. Often humorous anecdotes gave a unique account of the history of the chess tournament and Gerry's fondness for the town of Hastings was evident.

Behind the historic message of the event was a look to the future of chess in Hastings and the importance that it has for the community. In March 2006 UCH found a magnificent new home for the National Chess Library, a collection of over 6,000 books from the English Chess Federation.

Gerry Walsh said: 'The whole chess world knows about Hastings. It's a dream come true for the chess library to have found a home at UCH'.

The collection is now in the process of being cataloged and following an official opening, the library will offer access to the public.

The British Championship was won, for the fourth time, by double (otb and solving) GM John Nunn. The Open Championship was won by current World Solving Championship GM Piotr Murdzia from Poland.

5th Gibtelecom Chess Festival 23 January - 4 February

This was held in Gibraltar 23 January to 2 February 2007. There were five major events, but principal among these was the 176 players Masters which was this year a nine round Open Swiss.

Prizewinners: 1st Vladimir Akopian 7½ £10,000. 2-4= Alexander Areshchenko (Ukraine), Hikaru Nakamura (USA), Emil Sutovsky (Israel) 7/9 each £4333.5-17= Michael Adams (England), Mohamed Al-Modiahki (Qatar), Zahar Efimenko (Ukraine), Jaan Ehlvest (USA), Mikhail Gurevich (Turkey), Yuriy Kuzubov (Ukraine), Vadim Milov (Switzerland), Milos Pavlovic (Serbia), Thomas Rendle (England), Robert Ris (Netherlands), Chanda Sandipan (India), Ivan Sokolov (Netherlands) 6½ each £550, but some got higher rating prizes.

In all 33 grandmasters participated, but only Rendle and Ris are not GMs. Thomas received £2000 for his rating prize; he also scored his

first GM norm. Jovanka Houska (England) and Antoaneta Stefanova (Bulgaria) 6/9 each received £3000 for the top women's prizes. Jovanka also received a £1000 rating prize. She was talking of using Gibraltar as a tax haven. The prize money reserved to female players is probably the highest in the world, apart from the actual Women's World Championship. The Seniors prizes were shared between Viktor Korchnoi (Switzerland) and Nils-Ake Malmdin (Sweden 5/9 each £1000. Dronavalli Harika (India), David Howell (England) and Kateryna Lahno (Ukraine) 5½ each £333 for the Under-18 Prize. The £1000 Best Game Prize was shared unusually between Emil Sutovsky, Alon Greenfeld (Israel), Alain Dekker (South Africa and Iweta Rajlich.

Challengers A for players rated under 2200 was won by Lars Andreassen with $4\frac{1}{2}$ /5. B was won by Odin Blikra Vea with 5/5. He also received the best combined prize of £2000, while Andreassen got a further £1000. These rating prizes are unquestionably the highest outside the US.

Amateur A Under 1800 Russell Goodfellow, Ken Millward, Brendan O'Gorman 4/5 each £667. Amateur B Klaus Kuenitz 4½ £1000.

In all £71,000 prize money was distributed. There were 304 tournament entries, some people playing both in the morning and afternoon tournaments. 44 nationalities were represented in the event.

The event was much more than just a chess tournament. Stuart Conquest commentated live on the games in the Masters, especially on the Internet; there were two pairs blitz tournaments; leading players, together with an audience, analysed the games of lesser players; there were opening and closing receptions; an arbiters seminar; and even poker master classes. All this and the weather was considerably warmer than England at this time of year.

Held in the unique Art Nouveau surroundings of the Elmbank Hotel, the event was opened by the Lord Mayor of York, Councillor Janet Hopton, who welcomed competitors from all over Britain. Quoted in the York Press, she said "It was lovely to see all these young women play chess.....Chess is a great way to exercise the brain. It is a fascinating game."

Aldro Inter Schools Chess Tournament February 2007

This year's team tournament attracted 30 teams from the south east and once again the competition was of a high standard with some of the top schools playing.

The Under 8 section had 11 teams and for the first time since 2001 the home team came out on top. The Aldro players were playing for the school for the first and they won all three of their matches. The winning team was Jamie Cotta, Samuel Turner, Alexander Weir and Nicholas Palmer. In 2nd and 3rd place came Homefield B and A to win silver and bronze medals.





The U10 section was divided into major and minor sections with the B teams battling hard in the minor and the A teams in the major. The minor was won by Aldro B with 8 points of 12 and Homefield and St.Dunstans were 2nd equal with 7 points.

Book Reviews by Gary Lane

Starting out: Chess Tactics and Checkmates by Chris Ward

published by Everyman £14.99

There are always parents looking out for a tactics book for juniors and they would do well to start with Chris Ward's introduction to checkmates and combinations. It starts with some basic things from his observations by pointing out that two kings are always on the board. It sounds daft but at junior tournaments the king really is taken off the board on numerous occasions and as a respected coach the author knows his potential reader. The tactics might seem obvious to experienced players but still need to be learned at some point so we progress from trying to checkmate in four moves at the beginning of the game to more sophisticated attacks. This is complimented by discussing tactics and slowly but surely making them more difficult as the reader makes progress. An enjoyable way to improve.

The English Opening by Zenon Franco

published by Everyman £12.99

The grandmaster from Paraguay seeks to convince White to adopt the English Opening as a flexible and dynamic choice. A selection of 25 recent games are selected to give an impression on how to handle the opening by also exploiting the middlegame opportunities. It is easy to read and informative with the emphasis on the main lines. This is a repertoire book limited to 112 pages so as always things are neglected. It is not clear whether the reader wants a quick line on a defence or something in more detail. However, I suspect something on the popular Reversed Closed Sicilian (1 c4 e5 2 Nc3 Nc6 3 g3 g6) or what to if someone is a copycat by playing 1 c4 c5 2 Nc3 Nc6 3 g3 g6 4 Bg2 Bg7 but admittedly space is limited. An easy way to understand the English Opening.

Caro-Kann Defence - Panov Attack by Anatoly Karpov and Mikhail Podgaets published by Batsford £15.99

This is for the serious Caro-Kann player who wants a deep knowledge of the opening. In the second of their series on the opening the authors cover the Panov (1 e4 c6 2 d4 d5 3 exd5 cxd5 4 c4), which is certainly popular, and after 276 pages there should be enough knowledge for White or Black. Perhaps the only drawback is that the main games date from 2005 because the book was originally written in Russian and then translated by Jimmy Adams. There might be some concern that it will be difficult to keep up with the various options so helpfully there is an index at the end of each chapter for the keen student. It is not clear how much the former World Champion has written himself but I understand he had a big input. This is important because Karpov has certainly contributed greatly to the opening playing Black and White. The layout is good and Batsford maintain their tradition of putting out quality books. This version of the Caro-Kann is good news for the tournament player.

The Chess Combat Simulator by Jeroen Bosch

published by New In Chess £16.99

The idea of playing through a game and being awarded points for guessing the move is well known. Daniel King came up trumps with 'Test Your Chess' and if you are old enough to remember Leonard Barden did a fine work called 'How Good is Your Chess'. This is a popular way to study and Bosch does an entertaining job of appealing to club players by providing 50 interesting games. Garry Kasparov features in 6 of them while the English are represented by Adams, McShane and Conquest. It could be argued that the innovation is the chance to write the answers in the book with pages allocated for the purpose. Now this could be seen as a waste of space by some but I think many people never get round to sorting out a separate piece of paper and writing the moves down. A chance to gauge your chess playing skills.



In these sad times of a saturation of chess information, when we have such an abundance of 30-move chess variations not only going into our fatigued brains but practically coming out of our backsides, it is a joy to see a game like this month's effort. From the 4th move onwards we have a 'risky' commitment by a player doing his utmost to defy computer analysis and its adherents.

1 e4 e5 2 Nf3 Nf6 3 Nxe5 d6 4 Nxf7!?

This takes me back over fifty years to my first chess mentor, Charlie Gurnhill, who deliberately played this line against me many times to elicit my reaction which was invariably "What a load of rubbish!" prompting the terse reply "Play!". I did play but found it extremely difficult to beat him ...

4....Kxf7



Although Black has a piece for two pawns, defence is tricky, mainly because he needs at least three moves to safe-guard his king and White's hardly likely to allow this.


5 d4 Qe8

I can't remember ever playing this move but, at some point, I usually challenged White's centre with ... c5, as Kramnik tried against Topalov (!?) at Linares 1999, the game ending in an interesting draw. After the immediate 5...c5 6 dxc5 Nc6, Black is happy to get his pieces out, even at the cost of another pawn. In the present game Black is hoping to set up a blockade but, of course, it wastes a move he needs to lead his king to safety. Note that 5...Nxe4? loses a pawn to 6 Qh5+ g6 7 Qd5+ Kg7 8 Qxe4, although in Reinderman Van der Sterren (Amsterdam 1999) Black held out until move 42. He may have been intending 6...Ke7?? which fails to 7 Qe2! d5?? 8 Bg5+. Amusingly, there is a game in which both players twice missed this idea after 7 Bc4?? g6?? (7...Qe8) 8 Qh4+?? but White still won in 18 moves.

6 Nc3 d5 7 e5

If White wishes to maintain open lines, he could try 7 Nxd5 Qxe4+ 8 Ne3 but Black seems fine.

7...Bb4 8 Bd3 Ne4 9 0–0 Nxc3 10 bxc3 Bxc3



11 Rb1

Against Van den Bersselaar in 2000, Hoogendoom played the natural 11 Qh5+ g6 (not of course 11... Kf8?? 12 Ba3+ or 11...Ke7?? when one possible sequence is 12 Bg5+ Kd7 13 Qh3+ Kc6 14 Bb5+!? Kxb5 15 Qxc3 giving White a strong attack with an immediate threat of mate in 3 moves) 12 Qf3+ Kg8 (or 12...Ke6?? 13 Qf5+ Ke7 14 Bg5 mate) 13 Qxd5+ Be6?!14 Qxb7 and won, although Deviatkin gives 13...Qe6 as a better defence, as Sulskis presumably knew.

11...Nc6

Black still cannot play 11...Rf8, and shutting in his KR by 11...Kg8 seems a wretched idea, whilst 11... Bxd4? loses a piece after 12 Qf3+ Kg8 13 Qxd5+.



Threatening 13 Qf3+.

It appears that Black has now succeeded in setting up a satisfactory defence but Sulskis still has some tricks in store.





Obituary and Tributes Roy Woodcock

(17 May 1930 - 18 February 2007)

Robert McFarland writes:

Roy learned to play chess in his twenties shortly before becoming a founding member of Nuneaton Chess Club in 1958. He quickly became a leading member of the club, first as Club Secretary and then as Competitions Secretary and continued to hold official positions until late in his final illness. Under his leadership the club grew to be one of the largest and most successful clubs in the history of the Coventry League.

He was an innovative chess organiser and organised successful annual Coventry Chess Congresses in the period 1960 to 1965, in an era that largely predates the popular weekend congresses and one-day rapidplay tournaments.

He became Coventry League Chairman in 1967, a position he held almost continuously until 2005, despite the title changing to President. He was responsible for bringing some of the world's leading grandmasters to Coventry in the early seventies, most notable Korchnoi, Smyslov and Tal. In a further attempt to popularize and promote chess in Coventry organised annual chess he simultaneous displays as part of the Coventry Carnival which continued for around a quarter of a century.

His record of service to chess included being Chairman of Warwickshire Chess Association for circa 20 years, and actively managing and supporting its county teams.

He was responsible for bringing the British Chess Championship to Warwick University in Coventry in 1970, to celebrate the Coventry Chess League's Jubilee, a rare inland success.

As President of the Midland Counties Chess Union he made a contribution at a Midlands regional level and represented the MCCU at the BCF national board meetings on numerous occasions.

The Nuneaton Chess Tournaments/ Congresses organised by Roy total 45 over the years and made a national impact with many of Britain's leading chess grandmasters taking part. The last of these was organised in 2005 despite the seriousness and strain of his final illness.

In 1994, he was one of the sponsors of the Midland Monarchs'Team that went on to win the First Division Championship of the 4 Nations' Chess League.

Roy's contributions to chess are too numerous to give in full detail but he received some recognition of his achievement through receiving the national federation's President's Award for Chess and, more recently, becoming an Honorary Vice-President of the English Chess Federation.

Throughout such a record of organisational and administrative work in chess, Roy continued to play chess regularly with an energy and enthusiasm that saw him playing games in the Birmingham Chess League, and the Leamington Chess League, as well as the Coventry Chess League, all in the same season.

It might easily be thought that Roy's whole life was chess, but this was not so.


He was an electrical engineer by training, but took an active interest in the arts, becoming a trustee of the Nuneaton Arts Centre, and playing a leading role in its formation and development, helping to transform a practically derelict site into an attractive and thriving arts centre of which Nuneaton can be proud.

His range of personal interests, apart from his interest in sport and politics, included an interest in the arts which went beyond the Arts Centre and its many works to surprising his friends with his facility for reciting poetry from memory. He was always a lively companion and a loyal friend. Though he never married, he was close to his sister and her family and had many friends within and outside the chess world, who will remember not only his contributions and achievements, but also his personal warmth and charm.

No tribute to Roy would be complete without including some examples of his play. He was at his best as a player in the 1960's and two of his games are given below.



I am sure you will all be sorry to hear that the MCCU President Roy Woodcock passed away earlier today. He was of course much more than the MCCU President. Many of you will be aware of his extensive organisation and admin work for chess over many years. His passing will leave a vast hole in Midlands chess.

Peter Gibbs writes:

I am sad to report the death of Roy Woodcock who passed away on 18th February 2007, aged 76, at the George Eliot Hospital, Nuneaton. All his working life was spent at the GEC in Coventry.

I knew Roy for over 40 years and we were good friends. In regard to chess he enjoyed the cut and thrust of attacking play, but it was as a chess organiser that he found his métier both at national and Midland level. The popular Nuneaton Club Congresses were his brainchild and more recently he assisted the late John Robinson at the two Coventry International Congresses. His work for the Nuneaton Club has been incalculable. In fact I have never known him refuse help or advice to anyone planning to hold a congress.

He was also a safe pair of hands at meetings both nationally and in the Midlands. He could have trenchant views but was always willing to listen to a contrary opinion. At the date of his death he was the Honorary Life Vice-President of the Warwickshire Chess Association and President of the Midland Counties Chess Union. Some years ago he received the British Chess Federation's prestigious President's Award for Services to Chess about which I know he was delighted. More recently he received the rare distinction of becoming a Honorary Life Vice-President of the English Chess Federation which meant so much to him.

Within the last few weeks when he was very ill he remarked that he and I had never disagreed on any matter, chess or otherwise. That is indeed true but I was touched.

Iwouldnotwantanyonetothinkthat his interests were solely confined to chess. He was a person with wide interests. He was a friendly man who-loved people, good company and was a gourmet, especially after a chess competition. He loved his garden. He was interested in all forms of sport and we spent many happy hours discussing it, but especially the nuances of cricket. On television he watched tennis at Wimbledon avidly and we watched international football together during the last World Cup competition.

His passing will leave a void in the chess community.

Bruce Holland writes:

I have known Roy well for the past twenty years, and we started working together when the Warwickshire Chess Association was going through difficult and turbulent times. We became acquainted when he as President, and myself as the newly elected Treasurer, travelled together to Birmingham for a meeting with Dave Thomas to discuss the plight of the Association. Roy was a very shrewd judge of character, but would take his time in assessing those he didn't yet know, and I was only too well aware that I was being weighed up as the journey progressed. I am happy to say that I passed muster, and we became firm friends and collaborators in organising chess in and around the Midlands. A couple of months later at a pivotal meeting for Warwickshire we were set against each other in an election for the office of Delegate to the BCF.

There was no sense that we were in opposition to each other, quite the contrary, but the meeting was faced with a choice of candidates. I was voted into the post, and although Roy would have been quite happy to have been elected, he was very gracious about the "defeat" and helped launch me on my association with the national and regional chess organisations. I know that I was one of many that Roy helped on their way in the world of chess.

Roy was a born organiser. Perhaps one of his most notable achievements was his involvement in the organisation of the British Chess Championships in 1970, when this event was held, untypically, inland on the campus of Warwick University.

Roy maintained an extensive contact with people in the world of chess at all levels, the range was almost encyclopaedic. He particularly supported juniors, and he used his Nuneaton club to particularly good effect for junior chess. As has already been pointed out Roy maintained wide interests, one of which was thespian. It is perhaps fitting that those who attend the funeral will go afterwards to the Arts Centre in Nuneaton, an institution which he helped to found.

Roy served with distinction as President of the Warwickshire Chess Association for about 15 years, and some years later he was held in such high esteem that he was appointed to the Life Vice Presidency, an honour only rarely bestowed by the Association. He was in fact only the third person to hold this honour, the first being Mikhail Botvinnik and the second being Ritson Morry.

His club will sorely miss him, but so will many others way beyond the corner of the Midlands where he lived most of his life. We shall all miss his generosity of spirit.

I would also like to pay tribute to the late Roy Woodcock who died on Sunday. He was an invaluable friend and support to me when I was the Director of Marketing at the BCF (as it then was), and I can say that he was an absolutely honest and genuine person of immense integrity and stature. He will be missed by all who knew him, and he made a really positive contribution to chess in the UK.

George Goodwin Obituary

George died on Wednesday 28 February 2007 at the age of 80 after a long illness. He was a recipient of the BCF President's Award for Services to Chess.

He came to chess administration rather late in life, mostly after his career in the decorating trade, when his son, Stephen, became interested in the game. His own playing strength was just over 100. First he ran Highbury Grove School Chess Club, which undertook several international tours. Later he became a mainstay of the administration of Islington Chess Club.

The club was a chess powerhouse from the 1960s to 1980s. The 1965 Islington Congress introduced the whole idea of weekend tournaments to Britain and that event had over 1000 entries throughout the 1970s. George took over the running of this event from me when I moved out of the area, but by then he was also Chairman of the Club. He introduced many other weekend tournaments and one day rapidplays as well. At one time, you could play a chess congress, run by George, in North London, every other weekend. His drive and initiative was one of the reasons for the English Chess Explosion that took place. He was ably assisted in these ventures by Peer Larsen, who became mainly responsible for running the actual evening club; Tony Gaffney, who introduced a monthly grading list to London; and Simon Brougham.

Eventually ill-health meant that George had to retire from his chess activities and Islington Chess Club eventually faded slowly away, a shadow of its former self. Even the Islington Congress has stopped, brought to a close because of the harsh economics of the costs of venues in London.

Our condolences to his second wife Jane, son Stephen, daughters Sharon, Vanessa (actually born during one Islington Congress) and Lydia and grandchildren. The whole family was at one time so much a part of English chess.

The funeral will take place at noon at New Southgate Crematorium, 99 Brunswick Park Road N11 1JJ, nearest station Arnos Grove, on Thursday 8 March at noon. Donations rather than flowers should be sent to The Parkinson's Society.
