Obituary - Sir Jeremy Morse



As Chairman of Lloyds Bank, Sir Jeremy Morse, who died in February, not only saved the bank from the prospect of a real threat to its fortunes, but took the opportunity to arrange sponsorship for the wonderful Lloyds Bank Masters Tournament from 1977-1994, which was a crucial source of experience for a generation of young players, many of whom went on to become GMs and IMs, often assisted by the norms made available at this very tournament.

Sir Jeremy was a keen chess player himself in his youth but found his real forte in problem composition for which he has an international reputation. For his support over so many years, English chess owes him a great debt



Gawain Jones wins the Dubai Open




Gawain Jones won the very strong Dubai Open yesterday on a two-way tie-break with Vladimir Akopian, continuing his excellent form and pushing his Elo above 2660. Along the way he also managed to win the blitz which took place after round 4 and will leave with \$14,000 in prizes. 2015 was perhaps a little disappointing for Gawain but with his his victory in New Zealand, his strong showing in Reykjavik. and now this real double triumph, he looks to be performing at a whole new level. the Polar Capital Jersey Festival

The final round of the Polar Capital Jersey Festival saw GM Mark Hebden, who was already guaranteed at least equal first, draw with FM Alan Merry to secure an unshared first. The result also brings Hebden back into the 2500+ realm from which he had fallen in January 2015. On board 2, IM Jovi Houska, who had a real chance of winning the event, reaching 4.5/5 and already having faced two of her main rivals, was unable to keep up the momentum and saw her outside chance of equal first vanish when she lost to IM Alina L'Ami. This allowed GM Simon Williams to sneak by into sole second when he defeated FM Glenn House with Black. GM Hillarp-Persson, L'Ami and Merry joined Houska on equal 3rd.

Dedicated chess pro, Keith Arkell, whilst still a fixture at the upper end of the table in many international opens, is pretty prolific on the domestic scene. He has won 5 domestic opens on the trot, 3 of which he succeeded in doing so with a 1.5 point margin- a record for him.

Keith has kindly provided us with a very interesting draw he achieved in the Hastings Masters against GM Berkes which features an enterprising strategic exchange sacrifice by Arkell which led to interesting endgame play.

Like a broken record, Chris Ward, in the commentary room, continued his life-long banter against my 'style' of chess: "Wow! When was the last time Keith Arkell sacrificed the exchange?" Firstly, I will always sacrifice material if I consider it correct or a good practical decision to do so; and secondly Chris was actually playing in the tournament (the 2015 British Ch) in which I played this very same sacrifice to draw with David Howell! In truth I think Chris and I simply approach chess differently. I see elegance and beauty in an accurately played game, whereas he would rather roll the dice and sacrifice speculatively. Both methods have their followers.

13. Nxg5 Qxd4

Black's compensation is obvious. White's structure is damaged and he has lost control of the black squares. To elaborate more on this important moment in the game, White's best minor piece in this position, and analogous positions against the Caro-Kann, is his Black squared Bishop. Without it a lot of the energy goes out of his position. By comparison his light squared Bishop is somewhat ineffective as it has nothing to target. Equally importantly, when I speak of the structural damage my exchange sacrifice inflicts, more specifically I mean that with only an h-pawn and an f-pawn it is very hard for him to break down a defensive set-up of pawns on g6,f7,e6. Of course, it was necessary to first check the tactical variations - eg making sure that there

1st prize and David Newall 2nd when they both drew in final round 7. Both players, respectively 2nd and 1st seed, were neck and neck at the top of the table throughout and well deserve their prizes.



GM Vakhidov, Currently resident in London, won the open in a closely fought tournament which served as a worthy celebration of Colin Crouch's life and contribution to chess. Australian IM. Justin Tan, came second and achieved a GM norm with a 2610 performance.

The English Seniors Championship ran alongside the Open and ended in a tie for 1st between Oliver Jackson and Cliff Chandler.

Steve Martin, based in Sidmouth, sends us this amusing anecdote from his youth involving a lift and a witty GM:



"As a 20 year old I was in Leningrad in the early 1970's when it came to my attention that the hotel I was staying in had a strong chess tournament on the following day featuring a string of GMs. Being a keen player, at very close to the 2.00pm first round commencement time the next day, I left my room to get the lift to the top floor where the tournament was to take place. When the lift arrived I was got on and pressed for the 5th floor. At the next floor the lift stopped and in walked no less than five GMs all wearing identifiable name badges with GM on. I felt I was in the presence of the Gods! As the last one entered the lift buzzer went off indicating overload and, as a suitably deferent youngster, I insisted that I got out and used the stairs for the remaining 3 floors. The doors closed and in my excitement I raced up the remaining floors to arrive on the fifth floor just before the lift! As the doors opened one of the GM's joked "You must be the only chess player around who has beaten five GM's in under one minute!"

As a mere 184 grade and now over 60, I so wish I could recapture that form!"

With a nose for an even better story, your editor quizzed Steve on exactly who this GM might have been. He is not absolutely certain but he believes it was none other than Leonid Stein! We sincerely hope he's right! Stein has been somewhat neglected by chess history, probably because he missed out on competing in the Candidates due to restrictions placed on the number of competitors from each Federation. This was to avoid collusion and was with some justification aimed squarely at the USSR, but had unjust consequences for players, such as Stein, who really deserved the opportunity. His top flight career began late in life and ended tragically early with his death just before he was to fly to the UK with the USSR team but, at his zenith, he was certainly among the top 10 players in the world. His huge talent and aggressive playing style were viewed with tremendous respect, and not a little trepidation, by his GM colleagues, most of whom had found themselves victim to his blistering attacks at one time or another. He also had a reputation as something of a hard drinking, free-spirit, not that he allowed that to interfere with his brilliance at the chessboard, and it is thought that his excesses may have contributed to his early death.

Whilst the premier domestic event, the British has received criticism in recent years due to its failure to attract enough of our strongest players. This is set to change this year with the news that the top England player and world class GM, Michael Adams, has agreed to play. Watch out for news of further GM entries in the coming weeks.

The British is not all about the main tournament - as well as having junior championships for various age-groups it also has a number of great subsidiary tournaments for the chess enthusiast. Entries for all events are gradually building and if you are thinking of entering you are well advised to do so soon as, if you leave it too late, hotel rooms will certainly be at a premium!

THE ENGLISH WOMEN'S CHAMPIONSHIPS

The English Women's Championship will be held this summer from the 15th - 17th July in Birmingham - details can be found at http://www.englishchess.org.uk/competitions-plp/english-womens-championship/

There is a £1,000 prizefund, with £500 for the winner. There is an additional prize for the winner of qualifying for the women's team at the 2017 European Team Championships in Halkidiki, Greece.

This prize is normally awarded as part of the British Championships, and as a result, the British Women's Champion prize has been increased from £500 to £1,000. In addition, women who qualify to play in the main Championship will be entitled to free entry.

Additionally, some money is available by application for participation in FIDE title-norm events. Grants of up to £250 may be awarded. Women who wish to apply for this should e-mail the ECF Office at office@englishchess.org.uk in advance of participation in the event. Priority will be awarded to players who wish to participate in events under the auspices of the ECF.

THE GLORNEY GILBERT INTERNATIONAL

The Glorney Gilbert International is being held in Daventry 18-20 July 2016. This year France is joining England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales. This is a long running junior tournament in which many future stars have competed, now also a memorial for Jessie Gilbert and, this year with a French contingent on the way, it'll be particularly competitive and will provide extra good playing experience.
