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# Copy Deadline 10th July 2009



**Director of Finance:** Manages the preparation of the annual statement of Accounts of the Company and presents it on behalf of the Board, duly audited, to the Annual Meeting of Council. Oversees the records kept by the ECF Office, ensures they are accurate and adequate for accounting purposes and for the preparation of VAT and other statutory returns. Guides the work of the accounting staff in the Office. Prepares the Federation's annual budget, in liaison with the individual ECF Directors, the Board and the Finance Committee. Produces for the Board periodic management information and forecasts of income and expenditure; takes remedial action, as may be required, in consultation with the Chief Executive and the Board. Is responsible for the collection of Game Fee by the Manager of Finance and Management Services and office staff and provides forecasts of Game Fee income. Evaluates the various risks to which the ECF is exposed and proposes to the Board the appropriate course of action, including, as appropriate, insurance. Provides general advice to the Federation on financial matters, taxation, accounts and reporting requirements. Must possess, and provide evidence of, an appropriate accounting qualification.

Develops the ECF approach to membership (of all types), membership fees (including Game Fee) and benefits (including grading and representation) attaching to membership.

**Manager of Congress Chess:** This is a marvellous chance for the person taking this job to help define the job. Congresses are one of the three strands of chess in this country, along with County Chess and League Chess.

The successful applicant should have experience of running successful congresses and be an organiser in general good standing. The willingness to help events, offer advice and source assistance would be of prime importance.

**Manager of Prisons Chess:** There are more people on prison now than ever before. Chess is viewed by HMG as being an aid to resettlement of offenders and teaching many of the same values which are encouraged in our chess for schools program.

There is a need for someone to set up and co-ordinate chess in the prisons in England. The needs and opportunities vary from establishment to establishment. Preliminary contact has been made with the Dept for Justice and the successful candidate would be expected to build on the initial contacts and with assistance from others organise teaching and support for the inmates.

# **Manager of Chess for Schools:**

Reports to Director of Junior Chess & Education Has overall responsibility for supervising the ECF element of the national Chess for Schools scheme.

This includes

- Supporting the sponsors Holloid Plastics in the delivery of the chess sets to the schools. This will require that the Manager ensures that the ECF is represented at approximately 15 events held throughout the country at which the representative will be required to speak on behalf of the ECF.
- Development and sale of follow-up support packages to schools
- The establishment of a national network of affiliated chess academies.
- Responsibility for identification and implementation of any other measures necessary to ensure the success of the Chess for Schools scheme.
- Responsibility for the work of any officers who may be appointed with

agreement of the ECF Board to support the initiative.

 Liaison with any other ECF officers who are supporting the scheme and in particular the Chief Executive, Director of Marketing, the Manager of Coaching, and the ECF Office.

### Notes:

- CRB Enhanced Disclosure is required.
- The Manager is required to respond with due diligence to communications from members of the ECF Board, members of the Federation and the general public.
- An honorarium will be payable to a suitably qualified officer. Reasonable expenses will be reimbursed.

The ideal candidate will:

- · Have a successful track record in project management;
- Be a good public speaker;
- Have experience in junior organisation.

# **Direct Member Representatives**

Nominations are invited for Direct Member Representatives to take office for a period of one year after the end of the Annual General Meeting to be held on 17 October 2009. For the purpose of the election of Representatives, Direct members are grouped into the following four categories:

- (a) Honorary Life Vice Presidents, Vice Presidents, Corporate Vice Presidents, Honorary Life Members and Life Members.
- (b) Full Direct Members, Family Members, Veteran Members, Student Members, Special Members and Members with Disabilities.
- (c) Standard Members and Junior Members.
- (d) Basic Members and Basic Junior Members. Each of these four categories is entitled to elect two Representatives.

Nominations are sought among the four categories. If there are more than two nominations in any category, a first two past the post election will be held in that category in accordance with instructions to be issued by the Board.

Representatives are members of Council and must be and remain Direct members in the category for which they are elected throughout their period of office.

Currently there is a full complement of Representatives, who are eligible to stand for re-election if they so wish. New nominations need to be made by a Direct Member who is in the same group of members as the nominee and accepted by the latter. To be eligible, signed nominations and acceptances must be received at the ECF office by noon on Friday, 28 August 2009.

# ECF Partners Holloid Plastics in ground breaking chess project for English Schools

As part of a new Chess for Schools initiative, Holloid Plastics will finance and project manage the manufacturing and distribution of 100,000 free chess sets to 10,000 schools.

May 2009: The English Chess Federation's flagship project for the coming year is Chess for Schools – an endeavour to put chess sets in every school in England, and then follow up with the objective of establishing new school chess clubs. The original concept for the project came from the child of a Holloid employee bemoaning the lack of chess facilities at their school.

"This is a chess project on a scale never previously attempted in England, involving the delivery of thousands of free chess sets and supporting material – an opportunity that comes thanks to the generous leadership and sponsorship of Holloid Plastics", says the ECF's Chief Executive, Chris Majer.

Holloid Plastics has put together a specialist team to work on the Chess for Schools project. Project Manager Caroline Morris is supported by Emily Watts as Project Assistant. Public relations is being conducted by Clive Couldwell (Account Director, SE10) and sponsorship coordination by Jonathan Steffen (Managing Director, The Corporate Story). The project's Production Manager is Keith Elliott, Holloid Plastics' Technical Sales Director.

During the first year of the project it is planned to provide approximately 100,000 free chess sets to those schools that have registered. The proposed method of distribution is to hold regional launch days during which the recipients of the sets will collect their sets. Three or four small preliminary events in Surrey, Hampshire and Oxfordshire will be held in May and June 2009. Further details will be published in due course. The events will officially start in September 2009 and the chess sets will be manufactured by Holloid Plastics.

Henning von Spreckelsen, Holloid Plastics' Executive Chairman, says "Working with the English Chess Federation and our sponsors, we are committed to making the Chess for Schools project a resounding success. Uniquely, this project offers me an ideal opportunity to give something back for the support I have received from others in the past."

Says Chris Majer: "This initiative is the largest sponsorship that English chess has received. Thanks to Holloid Plastics' meticulous planning I am confident that the Chess for Schools programme will be a great success."

# New Medieval gallery at the British Museum

The Paul and Jill Ruddock Gallery devoted to the Museum's pre-eminent collection of medieval material

Opened 25 March 2009 • Gallery 40 • Admission free

The third of four new galleries opening at the British Museum this year, the Paul and Jill Ruddock Gallery of Medieval Europe is devoted to the British Museum's pre-eminent collection of medieval material. This gallery will place this great collection in its fullest historical context, integrating art with archaeology, covering the period from 1050–1500 AD. Some of the Museum's greatest British, European and Byzantine treasures will form the centrepieces for this new permanent space.

Unique, spellbinding objects such as the celebrated Royal Gold Cup, made in Paris between about 1370–80 AD under the patronage of the (princely) Jean duc de Berry, will act as gateways to the wider world of noble pursuits afforded by rare survivals of royal art from the Palaces of Westminster and Clarendon. The intricately carved citole, a unique medieval English musical instrument, will serve as a platform from which to understand the rituals and protocols surrounding aristocratic amusement. Centre stage within this context are the world famous Lewis Chessmen (around 1150–1200 AD), poignant survivals of a sophisticated courtly culture that existed along the seaboard of northern Europe.

Sacredart is equally well represented illustrating the major devotional developments of the age. The flourishing of the monasteries from the mid-eleventh century to their dissolution in the sixteenth is a topic given dramatic treatment from the Museum's rich resource of objects associated with abbeys, priories and convents. The magnificent tiled pavement from Byland Abbey, North Yorkshire, will be displayed alongside important monastic sculpture from Lewes Priory in East Sussex. The fundamental notion of religious images acting as an aid to devotion is developed by combining precious objects from the Byzantine world with contemporaneous pieces from western Europe in a stirring analysis of how the divine was represented in two different but related Christian cultures. Icon painting and ivories are juxtaposed with wooden figure carvings and jewellery to explore the imagery of Christ and the Virgin and to illustrate the periods of iconoclasm which affected Byzantium and western Christendom equally.

The Byzantine Empire was one of the major pivotal points on the medieval map. A section dedicated to Byzantium and its Neighbours examines its role as a trading capital and as a centre of intellectual and artistic ferment. Related displays developing the theme of internationalism demonstrate the vast movement of people and commodities around the medieval world at any one time by focussing on topics such as trade, pilgrimage and Crusade. All of the narratives are emphatically object-led and showcase many of the world's greatest medieval treasures.

I would also like to congratulate Stephen Gordon who achieved his final GM norm in round 9 of this year's 4NCL. His results over the first 8 rounds allowed him the luxury of knowing by arriving at the board in round 9 and facing a GM was sufficient for his final norm. Facing Michael Adams, Jonathan Speelman and Luke McShane is not the most relaxing way of celebrating a GM title but I'm sure he found time for a celebratory drink or two!

Guildford 2 finished third whilst White Rose and Barbican finished 4th and 5th. There are three places open to English clubs at the European Club Cup so in theory this would be Wood Green, Guildford and White Rose. It remains to be seen if all three take up their place although in previous years Wood Green and Guildford have turned it down. This would mean that White Rose, Barbican & Pride and Prejudice would be the three eligible teams.

In the "Demotion Pool" the bottom four teams were relegated and heading into the weekend North West Eagles, Bristol, Richmond and Sambuca Sharks were all three points or more from safety. In a crucial match in round 9 South Wales Dragons defeated Bristol 4.5-3.5 and this effectively sealed the fate of the bottom four.

# **Commonwealth Chess Championship 2009**

We have received the news that the Commonwealth Chess Championship that was due to take place in July in Malaysia has been cancelled. Instead putatively it will take place in Singapore 9-15 December 2009. Further details will be available in July.

Oxford won the Division Two title on game points from Pandora's Box whilst Poisoned Pawns recorded two wins and a round 11 draw to claim 3rd place. 4th place was only decided after six and a half hours when Alexis Harakis ground down Gavin Lock to give Jutes of Kent a 4.5-3.5 victory over Wessex and edge out Kings Head on game points who had narrowly lost 4.5-3.5 to Oxford.

The Demotion Pool saw Anglican Avengers, FCA Solutions, Wessex 2 and South Wales Dragons 2 start the weekend in the bottom four with only Brown Jack in realistic range. There was no real change to the league table and Brown Jack remained two points clear of the drop zone.

The FIDE open held alongside the GM event may have been won by Adam Ashton on 6/7, half a point ahead of Andrew Lewis but the outstanding performance came from Alexandra (Aly) Wilson who scored 5/7 against an average of 2213 and finished 3rd= gaining 35 rating points. It is great to see a young English lady perform so well in such a big event although ironically she is currently registered for the Swiss Federation and is therefore not currently eligible to play for England.

Her performance included wins against Gavin Lock and IM Richard Tozer and she was joint leader going into the last round before a loss to FM Andrew Lewis prevented her from an even better result.

For the record, she shared 3rd with Philip Bonafont, Alexandros Ethelontis, Jonathan Arnott, David Haydon and Giampiero Amato.

England sent two teams to the 9 round event in Austria. England 1 comprised Geoffrey James, Michael MacDonald-Ross, James Scholes and Stewart Reuben and England 2 was represented by Peter Wood, Clive Pemberton, Leonard Harris and John Rety.

The first team were seeded 23rd and finished 21st with 10 match points (2 points for a win and 1 for a draw) whilst the 2nd team were seeded 49th and finished 50th out of the 54 teams with six match points. Russia convincingly won the event with 17 match points out of 18.

# A Short Common Sense Note on the Nutrition of Chess Players Before and During Play Association of Chess Professionals Articles Roberto Baglione - Conclusions and recommendations

- Chess players should try to have breakfast daily.
- Avoid heavy eating before games. The last main meal before a game should be at least three hours before the start of play. If a player wishes to have something to eat nearer the start he/she may choose among fruits (whole ones, fruit salad or juices, raisins), cereal bars, pretzels, cookies, low fat yogurt with fruit or cereals, sports drinks.
- During the games drink fluids as required. Water is the preferred drink; fruit juices, tea, coffee, sports drinks are alternatives. The best strategy is to drink small quantities at regular intervals, and avoid being thirsty. It is also important to begin the activity properly hydrated.
- Eating during the game: cereal bars, fruits, raisins, dry fruits (almonds, e.g.), chocolate, cereal cookies, can be chosen. In all cases, eat and drink in moderation.
- Some characteristics of the urine can show the state of hydration, which gives players a very good reference. If at any moment of the day the color of the urine is dark yellow, it is small in volume and has a strong smell, then all these signs could be showing that the chess player might not be properly hydrated and, consequently, should drink plenty of water or fluids containing water in considerable proportion.
- It would be advisable for the elite chess players to take nutritional advice to cope with all the requirements that top-level chess entails. Nutrition plays a significant role in the sport performance.
- Physical activities should be considered as a component of the chess player training. For older players, regular walking is excellent. Consult your doctor or other professional as required.

# Midlands Junior Chess League 2009

The MJCL 09 continued where it left off, producing high quality fun chess from juniors throughout the Midlands. Cardiff were unable to defend their plate title due to transport difficulties, but 2 newcomers to the tournament in Bristol and Worcester Sixth form, certainly added to the competition.

It was Bristol who caught the eye first, showing lots of strength in depth. Worcester Sixth Form College also made impressive starts and after 3 matches both teams were sitting 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> respectively. The defending Champions, WJCA 1, almost went unnoticed as they took apart every team they faced to win all their league games and finish a comfortable 3 points ahead of the rest. The Championship 2<sup>nd</sup> place did though go down to the wire, with both of the teams, as the draw would have it, playing each other for the honour of who faced the mighty WJCA. It was Bristol who came out on top of this exchange although Worcester led 5.5-2.5 with four games remaining.

In the Plate Jamboree, Malvern didn't enter due to lack of support. In final, only one game per person but longer time controls). WJCA 1 started terribly with three out of the bottom four losing queens very quickly, fortunately, of the one that didn't a quick victory meant WJCA 1 were only 2-1 down and board five Jason managed to out fox his opponent to score checkmate with 2 rooks, before Queen and rook had time to react. 2-2 and game on. The top 2 boards were very close, going down to the wire on time and on material. Board 2 scored the victory and board 1 closed out a close game to draw and give WJCA 1 the victory.

It was a fantastic day out for everyone. The Bristol team played very well and have already pledged like WJCA and Malvern to return next year as I hope many more do to. The equipment was ably provided by Chessmaze International and I thank

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# Junior Squad Championships 2009

There were about 100 players competing in four age groups and as this was the last event in the John Robinson Grand Prix there was some keen competition. The Under 16 group saw Saravan Sathyanandha attempting to overtake James Foster at the top of the leader board. To do this he needed to get a minimum of 4.5 and hope James did not get over 3.5. This he accomplished in style winning the tournament with 5\6 followed half a point behind by Jean-Luc Weller with Martin Brown, Rhys Cumming and Nathan Talbot on 4. The U14 was dominated by Brandon Clarke. Although Felix Ynojosa had already won the Grand Prix Brandon was determined to prove himself a worthy second and did so with a perfect score. Public transport across the Czech Republic was successfully

Our first two days in the Czech Republic were social and cultural and we met in the lobby after a buffet breakfast. Trying to gain time for development. It's interesting to note that, 12 years later, Casa was to use the same idea against Fernandez, although he lost!



Alternatives are 11 d3 or, as played by Fernandez, 11 Kh1

# 17 Bxg6!?

This is Jim's extraordinary idea which I hadn't thought possible. An alternative which gives him the edge is 17 Qxf7+ Kxf7 18 Bc4+ Ke8 19 Bxg7, etc.

Not of course 17...hxg6 18 Rxe7 Qxd5 19 Rxg7+ Kh8 20 Rd7+ winning back the queen with four pawns up.





We are now back in my planned line.

Stopping the mate on d1. There is still a lot of work for me to do but I give the rest of the game without comment, in case any reader wishes to see how it finished.



# Book Reviews by Gary Lane

# Kasparov: How His Predecessors Misled Him About Chess by Tibor Karolyi and Nick Aplin, Batsford, £14.99.

The thing that the average person thinks when he sees the words Kasparov and predecessor is that it must be a new book in the award winning series. However, an amusing article for the English satirical magazine *Kingpin* has been allowed to expand to a whopping 271 pages. Basically, Karolyi analyses Kasparov's losses and continually jokes that it is Kasparov himself writing the notes, although Aplin translates the Hungarian he sometimes seems to have trouble explaining the humour. Confused? Well, you should be but it just about works for experienced players because the instructive notes are to a high standard. A big plus is that old games by world champions are introduced with similar positions to Kasparov's and the discussion on how best to play continues. If the book had been called *How to Beat Garry Kasparov* it would have saved everyone a lot of time and probably tripled sales.

This is worth checking out for players who want to know more about a great World Champion.

# Rampant Chess by Geoff Chandler and Keith Ruxton, distributed by Quality Chess, £14.99.

It is unusual for any self-published chess book to do well because hardly any high-street shops will stock them and unless there is a famous name on the front cover few will trust the analysis. I suspect *Rampant Chess* will be the exception. The enthusiastic amateurs asked thirteen leading players in Scotland to submit five of their best games and fill in a short profile of their life. All the games that arrived with analysis were soon put under the microscope of Chandler and Ruxton to be replaced by jokes, little quips and witty tales. It sounds like a recipe for disaster but it works well with Chandler coming across as being genuinely funny as long as you appreciate something like *Monty Python*. The notes to the games are sufficient and you can sense their admiration of some great examples. At the British championships the Scotch do far too well considering their numbers so it is a timely opportunity to sneak a look into their psychology. Andy Muir might well be aggressive on the board but his favourite piece of music is the sentimental *No Matter What* by Boyzone, Roddy McKay says he likes *The Clash* while Jonathan Rowson mentions Indian flute music especially by Hariprasad Chaurasia.

They have thought about marketing because Rowson is the famous name that writes the Foreword, all profits go to *Chess Scotland* and extra analysis is available for free in an Edinburgh pub called Sandy Bells.

An amusing way to spend some time admiring Scottish chess.

# Secrets of Endgame Technique by Mark Dvoretsky and Artur Yusupov, published by Edition Olms £18.00

I was alerted to this book by a friend who had finally got round to reading it. This is the thing with books by Dvoretsky that the author comes with a good reputation for producing works for top players but the majority of buyers can't follow what is going on. I have to record that this is another fine effort on the ending but it is aimed at people with ratings of at least 1800 because there is an assumption that you already have a good knowledge of the ending. If you think that your level of play ticks those boxes than this is a treat for readers who want to know how to win when they have an advantage in the ending. The examples are generally well chosen and the instruction top class. The only snag for my friend who had started reading the book was the realisation he had previously tried and failed to absorb it before under a previous title *Technique for the Tournament Player* published in 1995. There is admittedly new material but some of it is rather odd. For example a long ending is given only for someone to add the note that the resulting position is not a win because "....John Nunn and Graham Burgess checked the concluding position of this variation on a computer, and it transpired that after 24 Qb8+ Black cannot avoid perpetual check". It begs the question why are pages devoted to a faulty line and not replaced with something new?

An interesting read for experienced players.


