Yes, folks. During the pandemic the chess world is changing, and such venerable institutions as GingerGM – as English as a swift lunchtime pint in a Godalming pub garden – will never be quite the same again.

For the Play Magnus Group has <u>bought control</u> of cheeky chappie Simon Williams' publishing company GingerGM – the latest in a series of ambitious acquisitions by the World Champion's public company, which <u>floated on the Oslo Stock Exchange</u> in October 2020.

The original Gordon 'Greed is Good' Gekko speech from the 1987 film Wall Street may have been all about cut-throat corporate mergers and acquisitions in 1980s America, but we're now seeing a similar buying spree in the chess world – this time not from New York City, but Norway.

And our new Øslø øverlørds are taking advantage of a similar economic opportunity – during a pandemic, assets are cheap, and the synergies are manifold.

Want to watch the best chess tournaments in the world? Play Magnus Group owns the tournaments – the Champions Chess Tour – and the website you'll watch them on, Chess24.com.

There you'll be invited to spruce up your game with the online training site <u>Chessable</u>, and even get some individual coaching through another Play Magnus affiliate, <u>CoChess</u>.

Or if you're old-school and prefer to read about chess in a printed magazine or book, Play Magnus has you covered too – thanks to its acquisition of the renowned Dutch chess magazine publisher, New in Chess, and of Everyman Chess, one of the world's most prominent chess book publishers (with an extensive and valuable back catalogue).

The list goes on, and the buying spree is probably not over yet by a long chalk.

So you think you're immune from catching the Play Magnus bug? Think again. Let me illustrate.

Full disclosure: I am the team captain for <u>Chessable White Rose</u> in the 4NCL Online, so who knows? Maybe I'll get a call from Oslo I can't refuse, and Magnus Carlsen will pitch up and play for us one Tuesday evening, under one of his lichess.org aliases, <u>DrNykterstein</u>?

And once over-the-board chess resumes, which major chess tournament would sensibly turn down the offer of Magnus's sponsorship money?

If so, I guess it pays to jump to the front of the queue. Here goes (shameless plug alert!):

In this context, I can humbly recommend Magnus to check out the excellent OTB open tournament the Northumbria Masters, recently given the all-clear to go ahead on 26-30 August, 2021 at Novotel Newcastle Airport, just three miles from Newcastle Airport (once travel restrictions are lifted, Norwegian Air and KLM have very reasonable flights from Oslo). As we re-emerge from lockdown, surely the Northumbria Masters would be an ideal tournament for the Play Magnus Group to sponsor, expanding its growing presence from online to OTB events.
