1.10 Chess Club Equipment: Pieces	Player acquiring virus by touch	<ul> <li>Possible action you may take:</li> <li>As with FIDE regs for blind players, use two boards for each match up, including calling out the moves</li> <li>Providing each player with his own set of pieces for the playing session. For informal games, relaxing normal playing conventions (eg removing your own pieces from the board when taken)</li> <li>When playing the same opponent informally with opposite colour, retain the same pieces but swap K &amp; Q around</li> <li>Provision of adequate hand sanitizing dispensers in the playing hall for use throughout the playing session</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Consider:</li> <li>Location of hand sanitisers, making the cleaning of hands easier</li> <li>For informal games, players being co-operative to avoid risk of contamination by touching only your own pieces</li> <li>Any adjustments to playing protocols must be made within the laws of chess if a game is to formally graded. The use of two boards for the same game would be acceptable</li> </ul>

Until the guidance changes, it may be necessary to restrict players to one opponent per playing session</li> </ul>
